With Pope Francis's encouragement, the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development and the International Union of Superiors General designated February 8 as an annual day of prayer, reflection, and awareness against human trafficking. On this day, the faithful across the world are encouraged to support, remember, pray for, and be in solidarity with those affected by human trafficking. February 8 also coincides with the Feast Day of St. Josephine Bakhita.

St. Bakhita (born in the Darfur region of Sudan in 1869) was kidnapped and enslaved as a child and trafficked to Italy. She won her freedom with the help of the Canossian Sisters in Venice. Through her faith, St. Bakhita realized the promise of liberty inherent in the human spirit. She lived out the rest of her life as a Canossian Sister, sharing her empowering testimony of human freedom and dignity.

In October 2000, Pope John Paul II canonized Josephine Bakhita, noting that in this saint, "we find a shining advocate of genuine emancipation."
